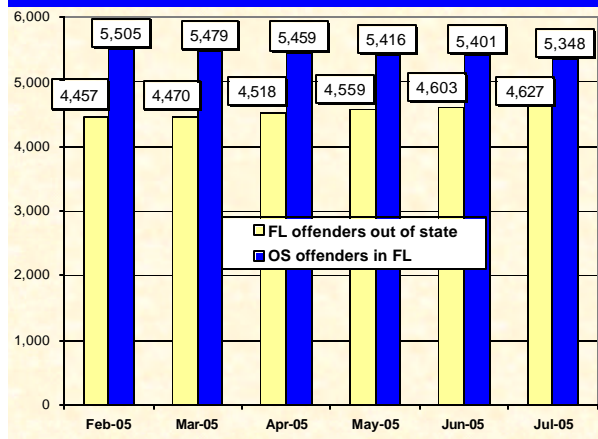


## Offenders supervised in Florida and Out of State



### Where can the Interstate Compact forms be found?

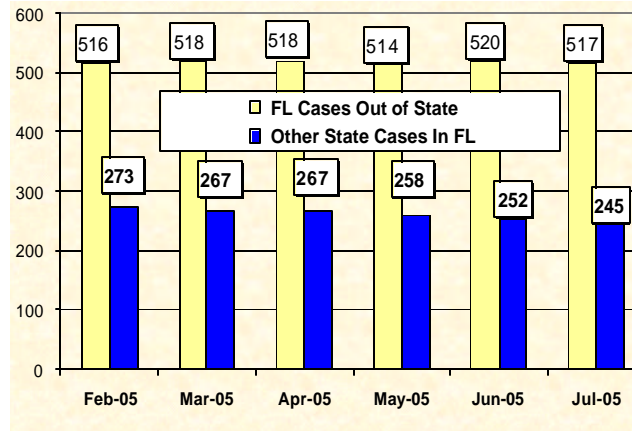

### Once the other state offender is accepted for supervision in Florida, what is the cost of supervision fee?

Indigent offenders are charged \$50 and non-indigent offenders are charged \$103.72 monthly. Other state court orders setting or waiving cost of supervision fees do not apply to Florida supervision fees.

## Sex Offenders supervised in Florida and Out of State



### Florida Statute 949.07 Compact for the supervision of adult offenders.—

(1) The compacting states to this interstate compact recognize that each state is responsible for the supervision of adult offenders in the community who are authorized pursuant to the by-laws and rules of this compact to travel across state lines both to and from each compacting state, in such a manner as to track the location of offenders, transfer supervision authority in an orderly and efficient manner, and, when necessary, return offenders to the originating jurisdictions. The compacting states also recognize that Congress, by enacting the "Crime Control Act," 4 U.S.C. s. 112, has authorized and encouraged compacts for cooperative efforts and mutual assistance in the prevention of crime.

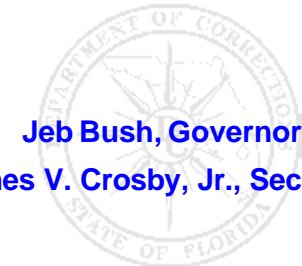

## Florida's Interstate Compact for Adult Offenders on Supervision

**The Interstate Commission for Adult Offender Supervision (ICAOS)** was created to ensure cooperation and coordination among the states in the transfer of supervised offenders across state boundaries. The ICAOS provides oversight and assistance in administering the Interstate Compact for Adult Offender Supervision, which was approved in 2002. This Compact has the authority of federal law and supersedes any state law to the contrary. All state and federal courts and administrative bodies must abide by the rules of this compact. *No court or paroling authority may authorize an offender to relocate before acceptance by the receiving state.*

### How many states are part of the Compact?

All 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands are members of this interstate agreement.

### How does the Compact work?

Offenders on supervision notify their assigned probation officers that they wish to relocate their supervision to another state. The assigned officer would first ensure the offenders are current toward their monetary obligations and in substantial compliance with their orders of supervision. The officer would then determine if the offenders meet the eligibility requirements for a transfer of supervision.

### Who is eligible to transfer under the Interstate Compact?

An offender who has three months or more or an indefinite period of supervision remaining may be eligible with a valid plan of supervision, providing the offender

- Is in substantial compliance with the terms of supervision; and
- Is a resident of the receiving state; or
- Has resident family in the receiving state who have indicated a willingness and ability to assist in satisfying the plan of supervision and can obtain employment or has a visible means of support.

### Can both misdemeanants and felons apply for transfers?

Misdemeanants sentenced to supervision for crimes involving physical harm, firearm offenses, second offense DUIs and sex offenses may be eligible for interstate transfer, depending on their specific sentences. Felons who have been placed on probation or parole may be eligible.

### What are the requirements for registra- tion (both felony and sex offender) in Florida and other states?

Sex offenders and felony offenders are required to register in Florida within two days of arrival. Registration requirements may vary in other states.

### How long does the Interstate transfer process usually take?

The transfer process usually takes 45 to 60 days from the date the request is received by the other (receiving) state.

### Can a Florida offender transfer to another country?

No. The Bureau of Interstate Compact does not process transfers to other countries.

### Will an offender need to remain in Florida while waiting for a state to respond to the transfer request?

Offenders who do not qualify for reporting instructions must remain in Florida until a response is received from the receiving state.

### May additional conditions of supervi- sion be imposed by the receiving state?

Yes. A receiving state shall supervise an offender transferred under the Interstate Compact in a manner determined by the receiving state and consistent with the supervision of other similar offenders sentenced in the receiving state.

### How many offenders are supervised under the Interstate Compact Program?

On average, Florida supervises about 5,300 out-of-state offenders each year, and transfers about 4,600 offenders to other states. See charts on back for more detailed statistics.
