# Community Programs





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#### **PROGRAM TYPES**

The Florida Department of Corrections has developed Correctional Substance Abuse Programs at Institutional and Community-based sites throughout the state. These programs serve offenders with substance involvement, abuse, dependence, and other related problems, including employment issues. The substance abuse programs' principle objectives are to identify substance abusers, assess the severity of their drug problems, and provide the appropriate substance abuse program services. The Department of Children and Families, in accordance with Chapter 397, Florida Statutes and Chapter 65D-30, Florida Administrative Code, licenses all substance abuse programs.

Offenders screened as being in need of services are either referred to a program or placed on a waiting list pending availability of needed programming. The Bureau of Substance Abuse Programs is responsible for the coordination and delivery of these services listed below for offenders under community supervision.

- Nonsecure (Short-Term) Substance Abuse Treatment Programs are six (6) month community-based substance abuse therapeutic communities with two (2) components. The Intensive Treatment Component (ITC) generally lasts two (2) months depending upon an individual offender's progress in the program and clinical need. During the ITC, the offender participates in counseling, therapeutic and educational/vocational activities at the residential facility. The Employment/Re-Entry component (ERC) lasts four (4) months with a primary focus on successful re-entry into the community. During the ERC, gaining and maintaining employment is incorporated into the offender's treatment plan. The offender resides in the treatment facility while maintaining gainful employment in the community. In this component, the offender participates in a minimum of four (4) hours of counseling activities per week; one (1) individual counseling session each month or more frequently if clinically indicated; twenty (20) hours of therapeutic activities per week. The residential program is staffed by paid awake staff twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week.
- Long-term Residential (Secure) Substance Abuse Treatment Programs are programs that generally last up to 18 months. The community-based, long-term substance abuse therapeutic communities (secure indicates a long-term program, not a program in a locked facility) with two (2) components. The Intensive Treatment Component (ITC) generally lasts four (4) to twelve (12) months depending on clinical need. During the ITC the offender participates in counseling, therapeutic and educational/vocational programming as appropriate at the residential facility. The Employment/Re-Entry component (ERC) generally lasts six (6) months with a primary focus on successful re-entry into the community. During the ERC, gaining and maintaining employment is incorporated into the offender's treatment plan. The offender resides in the treatment facility while maintaining gainful employment in the community. In this component, the offender participates in a minimum of four (4) hours of counseling per week; one (1) individual counseling session each month or more frequently if clinically indicated; twenty (20) hours of therapeutic activities per week. The residential program is staffed by paid awake staff twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week.

#### **PROGRAM TYPES**

- Probation and Restitution Centers (PRCs) are community-based residential programs for selected offenders under Department supervision and for recently released inmates. The program consists of a four (4) to six (6) month Residential Program Phase (Phase I) followed by a three (3) to six (6) month extended Support and Follow-up Services Phase (Phase II) during which participants reside within the community. The PRC offers a sentencing alternative to the courts while providing a resource for participants who experience difficulty meeting their court-imposed financial obligations to victims, the courts, and the Department. Additionally, PRCs provide transitional assistance to newly-released inmates during their re-entry into the community. The program provides a continuum of services that offer at a minimum employability skills, job placement, budgeting skills development and assistance, vocational and educational training through linkages to community-based employers and providers, substance abuse services, transitional housing, support services to facilitate successful participation in the community, and other such services to promote personal responsibility, self-improvement and public safety.
- Outpatient Treatment Programs are community-based contracted programs that provide individual, group and or family counseling sessions and activities for offenders who are ordered by the court or releasing authority to participate in treatment. Outpatient services are provided on a variety of intensity levels statewide based on the individual offender's needs. These therapeutic activities and interventions focus on changing the offender's behaviors to assist them in their recovery from substance abuse and successful termination from community supervision. Offenders continue to reside and work in the community while participating in treatment. All programs are licensed by the Department of Children and Families.

Number of Offenders Enrolled in the Program on June 30 <sup>th</sup>	Also referred to as a status population, this is the number of offenders enrolled in the program on the last day of the fiscal year. This number is unduplicated by offender within program type.

NONSECURE	A six (6) month residential substance abuse treatment program for offenders on community supervision. The first component is the Intensive Treatment Component, generally lasting two (2) months. It is followed by the Employment/Re-entry Component lasting approximately four (4) months with a primary focus on successful re-entry into the community.

SECURE	A residential Therapeutic Community (TC) program that generally last up to eighteen (18) months for offenders on community supervision with severe substance abuse disorders. The program has an Intensive Treatment Component generally lasting up to twelve (12) months and an Employment/Re-entry Component up to six (6) months with a primary focus on successful re-entry into the community. Offenders are monitored by staff twenty-four (24) awake-hours. However, it is not a lock-down program.			
PROBATION AND RESTITUTION CENTERS (PRCs)	Community-based programs consisting of a four (4) to six (6) month Residential Program Phase followed by a three (3) to six (6) month extended Support and Follow-up Services Phase during which participants reside within the community. The PRC offers a sentencing alternative to the court while providing a resource for participants who experience difficulty meeting court-imposed financial obligations. Additionally, PRCs provide transitional assistance to newly released inmates during their re-entry into the community. The program provides a continuum of services that promote personal responsibility, self-improvement and public safety.			
OUTPATIENT	Outpatient services provided to offenders on community supervision at varying levels of intensity based on the offender's needs, including Drug Court programs. Services include intake and assessment, group and individual counseling, etc.

RECOMMITMENT	The percentage of program participants who return to the department within a given time period. It includes returns to prison and community supervision for either a new offense or a technical violation. Recommitments for offenders in Community based programs are based on a follow-up period beginning with the start date of treatment. The exit date may be any time within the follow-up period. Recommitments may occur as a result of an offense or technical violation while in treatment. This, of course, results in a program exit due to revocation of supervision. Recommitments may also occur following treatment exits (successful completion, unsuccessful or administrative exit) while still on supervision or after supervision release date.

RECENTLY RELEASED INMATE(S)	Inmates who have been released from custody no longer than ninety (90) days before entering Probation and Restitution Center (PRC) or a post-release transitional housing program.			

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### COMMUNITY PROGRAMS REPORT

This report covers the time period from July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015. Data are reported in sections by program type. Each section includes an executive summary and sub-sections on workload, program outcomes and recommitment by program type as of June 30, 2015. Although the historical data covered in this time period has been previously reported, this report is intended to supersede *The Community Corrections' Residential Offender Programs Report*. Improvements in data collection, methodology and reporting format have allowed for the more accurate and complete portrayal of the data.

There is a companion report titled, <u>Substance Abuse Annual Report: Inmate Programs</u> that uses the same format to detail substance abuse programs in state prisons.

Salient points concerning the demographic breakdown of program participants by gender, race and age for new enrollees in FY 2014-15 are as follows:

- Female offenders received the majority of their program services in the Nonsecure (34.2%) and Outpatient (27.4%) programs.
- Probation and Restitution Centers (PRCS) (34.3%) and Outpatient (26.1%) programs served a larger percentage of Black offenders than other programs.
- The eighteen (18) to twenty-four (24) age group comprised the largest percentage of participants in most program types: Nonsecure (24.7%) PRC (47.2%) and Outpatient (26.9%).

Success rates (excluding administrative exits) three (3) years after initial program entry for Fiscal Year 2011-12:

- Are lowest for Secure Treatment programs (61.8%).
- Are highest for Outpatient Treatment programs (76.9%).

Success rates (excluding administrative exits) by age (at program exit) three (3) years after initial program entry for Fiscal Year 2011-12:

• Older offenders were more successful than younger offenders for most program types. Those aged forty-five (45) and older were the most successful of all releases from Nonsecure (78.6 %) Secure (83.6%) and Outpatient (83.0 %).

Two (2) year recommitment rates for successful residential substance abuse program completers in FY 2012-13:

- Long-Term (Secure) Programs (17.2%)
- Nonsecure (Short-Term) Programs (23.5 %)

Two (2) year recommitment rates for successful program completers in (FY 2012-13) by age group:

- In Nonsecure facilities, the age group that was most successful and had the lowest recommitment rate (18.6%) after two (2) years was ages forty-five or older (45 or older) and the highest recommitment rate in Nonsecure facilities was in the age group of thirty-five (35) through thirty-nine (39) with a (27.6%) recommitment rate.
- In Secure facilities, ages forty (40) through forty-four (44) had the lowest recommitment rate (12.5%) and ages thirty-five (35) through thirty-nine (39) had the highest (22.2%).
- In Outpatient facilities, ages forty-five (45) and older had the lowest recommitment rate (4.6%) after two (2) years and ages forty (40) through forty-four (44) had the highest recommitment rate (8.1%) for Outpatient facilities.

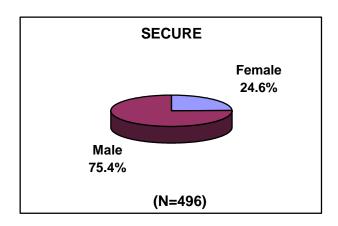

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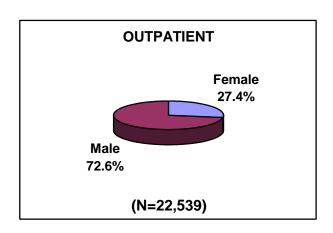

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#### GENDER OF NEW ENROLLEES FY 2014-15 BY PROGRAM TYPE

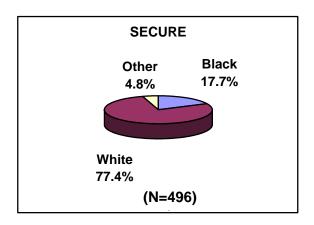


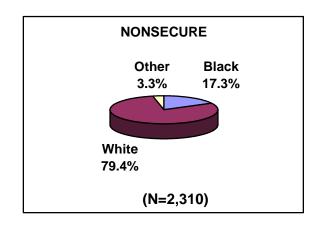


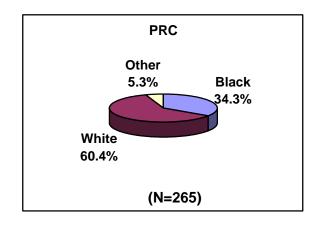


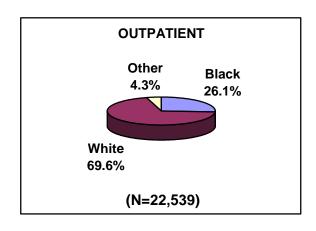


#### RACE OF NEW ENROLLEES FY 2014-15 BY PROGRAM TYPE









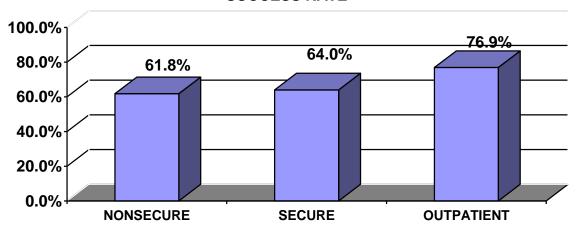

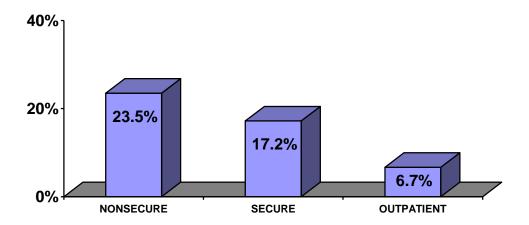

#### WORKLOAD

#### Table 1A: Nonsecure Treatment Program Enrollment Data by Fiscal Year

- Enrollment increased in (FY 1999-00) to more than 3,500 and have steadily decreased with enrollments dropping to 2,489 in (FY 2014-15).
- Over the course of ten (10) years, the number of different offenders participating in a Nonsecure program has dropped from 4,388 to 3,145.
- There were 935 offenders in the programs on June 30, 2015.

#### Table 1B: FY 2014-15 Nonsecure Treatment Program Enrollment Data by Facility

- Most programs have fewer than 100 offenders at any given time.
- The programs with the largest number of different offenders enrolled during this fiscal year are WestCare GulfCoast-Florida, Inc St. Petersburg (308) and DACCO-Tampa (319).

#### **OUTCOMES**

#### Table 1C(a): Nonsecure Treatment, Program Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

- This table shows outcomes based on a three year follow-up after the offender first entered a program of this type. They are counted as successful if they *completed* at least one (1) program, regardless of the number of programs they participated in.
- On average, Nonsecure programs have had a (61.7%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits) since inception.
- Success rates have remained close over the most recent ten (10) year period, from (59.9%) in FY 2002-03 to (61.8%) in FY 2011-12.

#### **Table 1C(b):** Nonsecure Treatment, Program Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

• This table shows outcomes based on a two (2) year follow-up after the offender first entered a program of this type. For FY 2012-13, Nonsecure programs had a (62.7%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits).

#### **Table 1D:** FY 2014-15 Nonsecure Treatment Exit Data (Event-Based) by Facility

• Reviewing the outcome of the offender's experience in each program from which they exited, the success rate varies from a low of (41.3%) for The Salvation Army – Daytona Beach to a high of (81.0%) for Goodwill Industries-Suncoast, Inc.-St. Pete and Susan B. Anthony Center Inc.-Lauderhill.

• On average, these programs had a (59.7%) success rate with each offender exiting their program during this fiscal year. Administrative exits averaged (10.7%) for the year. As seen in the prior table many of these administrative exits lead to subsequent enrollments in other programs.

#### RECOMMITMENTS

## **Table 1E:** FY 2012-13 (Two-Year Follow-up) Nonsecure Treatment Recommitment Data by Level of Participation

- At two (2) years after the program completion, recommitment rates for Nonsecure program completers (23.5%) are substantially lower than for program non-completers (52.0%) and this pattern is true for each recommitment type, except for return to supervision for a technical violation.
- Completers are about half as likely as non-completers to commit a new offense and return to prison (5.2% vs. 10.3%) and less likely to return to supervision for a new offense (1.4% vs. 2.8%).
- The greatest difference in recommitment rates is between those admissions/returns to prison for a new offense or technical violation who completed the program (15.8%) and those who did not (43.7%).

# **Table 1F:** FY 2011-12 (Three-Year Follow-up) Nonsecure Treatment Recommitment Data by Level of Participation

- For a three (3) year follow-up period, Nonsecure program completers remain lower than non-completers in overall recommitments (32.0% vs. 55.1%).
- The only category that is greater for completers than non-completers is return to supervision for a technical violation (4.5% vs. 4.0%).
- The greatest difference in recommitment rates is between those admissions/returns to prison for a new offense or technical violation who completed the program (23.9%) and those who did not (46.0%).

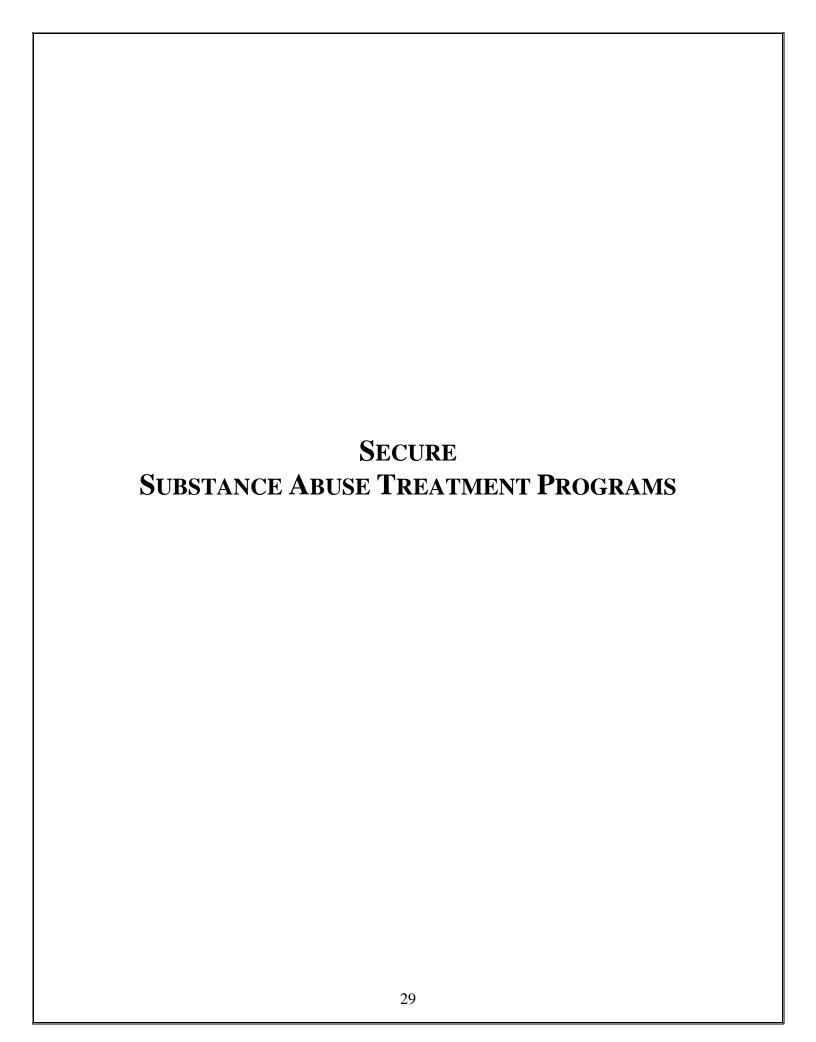

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### SECURE SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

Long-term Residential (Secure) Substance Abuse Treatment Programs are community-based, full service, long-term substance abuse therapeutic communities (secure indicates a long-term program, not a program in a locked facility) with two (2) components. The Intensive Treatment Component (ITC) lasts four (4) to twelve (12) months depending on clinical need. During the ITC, the offender participates in counseling and therapeutic and educational/vocational programming as appropriate at the residential facility. The Employment/Re-Entry component (ERC) generally lasts six (6) months with a primary focus on successful re-entry into the community. During the ERC, gaining and maintaining employment is incorporated into the offender's treatment plan. The offender resides in the treatment facility while maintaining gainful employment in the community. In this component, the offender participates in a minimum of four (4) hours of counseling per week. The residential program is staffed by paid awake staff twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week.

• Due to funding reductions, the Secure programs new enrollments have decreased over the last ten (10) years from (681) in FY 2005-06 to only (522) new enrollments in the current year (FY 2014-15). In FY 2014-15, there were 836 different offenders enrolled in the program and (347) were enrolled in the program on June 30, 2015.

• The programs vary substantially in size. While First Step of Sarasota, Inc. had (11) offenders on June 30, 2015, Phoenix House - Citra had (183) offenders.

#### Table 2C(a): Secure Treatment, Program Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

- This table shows outcomes based on a three (3) year follow-up after the offender first entered a program of this type. They are counted as successful if they *completed* at least one (1) program, regardless of the number of programs they participated in.
- Secure programs had an average (52.9%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits) over a ten (10) year period.
- Success rates have increased over the ten (10) year period from (48.6%) in FY 2002-03 to (64.0%) in FY 2011-12.

#### Table 2C(b): Secure Treatment, Program Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

• This table shows outcomes based on a two (2) year follow-up after the offender first entered a program of this type. For (FY 2012-13) Secure programs had a (64.8%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits).

#### **Table 2D:** FY 2014-15 Secure Treatment Exit Data (Event-Based) by Facility

- The success rate varies from a low of (34.9%) for House of Hope Ft. Lauderdale., to a high of (68.1%) for WestCare Secure Program.
- On average in FY 2014-15, these programs had a (57.9%) success rate with offenders exiting their program during this fiscal year. Administrative exits averaged (14.6%) for the year. As seen in the prior table, many of these administrative exits lead to subsequent enrollments in other

### <u>Table 2E: FY 2012-13 (Two-Year Follow-up), Secure Treatment Recommitment Data by Level of Participation</u>

- At two (2) years after program exit, recommitment rates for Secure program completers are substantially lower than for program non-completers (17.2% vs. 51.2%) This pattern holds true for each type of recommitment, except for return to supervision for a technical violation.
- Completers (14.1%) are lower in total recommitments to prison or community supervision for a technical violation than non-completers (43.3%).
- Prison recommitment rates for program completers are substantially lower than non-completers (10.0% vs. 45.3%).

## <u>Table 2F: FY 2011-12 (Three-Year Follow-up), Secure Treatment Recommitment Data by Level of Participation</u>

- For a three (3) year follow-up period, Secure program completers remain lower than non-completers in overall recommitments (24.5% vs. 58.7%).
- The greatest differences are for Admission/Return to prison (new offense or technical violations) for completers (16.7%) versus non-completers (50.6%).

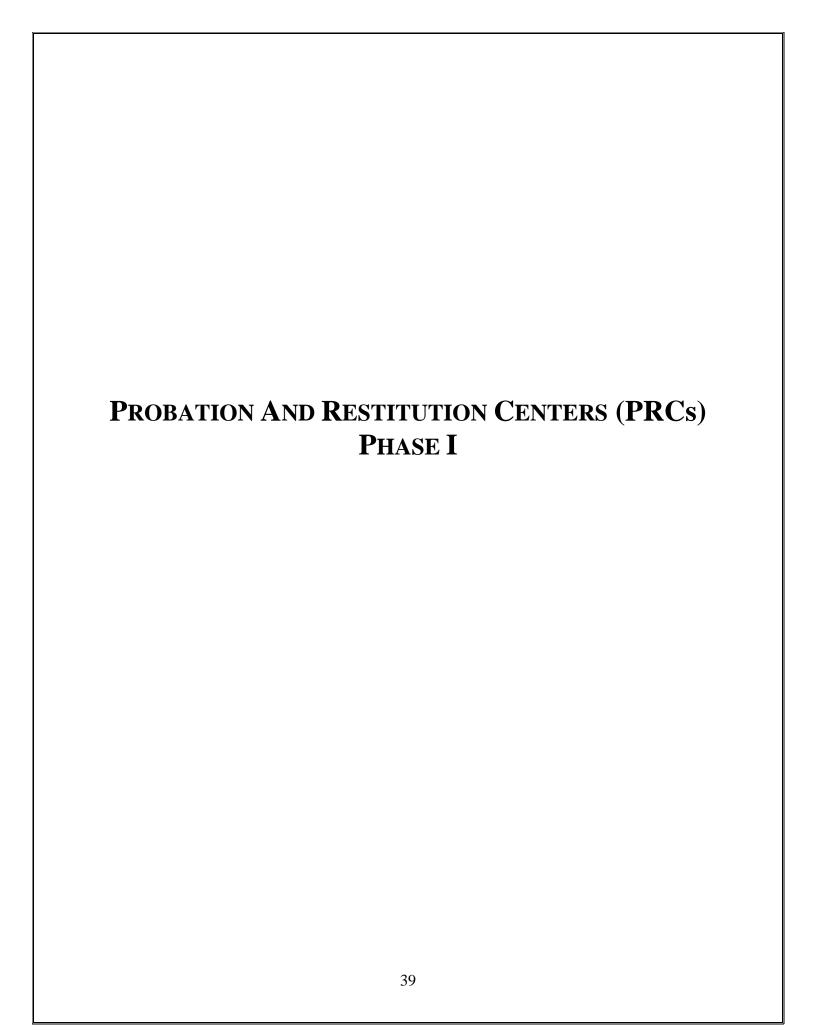

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

## PROBATION AND RESTITUTION CENTERS

Probation and Restitution Centers (PRCs) are community-based residential programs for selected offenders under Department supervision and recently released inmates. The program consists of a four (4) to six (6) month Residential Program Phase. Phase I, followed by a three (3) to six (6) month extended Support and Follow-up Services Phase (Phase II), during which participants reside within the community. The PRC offers a sentencing alternative to the courts, while providing a resource for participants who experience difficulty meeting their court-imposed financial obligations to victims, the courts, and the Department. Additionally, PRCs provide transitional assistance to newly-released inmates during their re-entry into the community. The program provides a continuum of services that offer at a minimum employability, job placement, budgeting skills development and assistance, vocational and educational training through linkages to community-based employers and providers, substance abuse services, transitional housing, support services to facilitate successful participation in the community, other such services to promote personal responsibility, self-improvement, and public safety.

## Table 3A: PRC Enrollment Data by Fiscal Year

- PRC facilities had 1,171 new enrollments in FY 1999-00. Enrollments dropped to 645 in FY 2000-01 and to a low of 228 in FY 2002-03 due to the anticipated closure of PRCs. Enrollments are slightly lower in FY 2014-15 (277) than the previous year, FY 2013-14 (296).
- In FY 2014-15, (334) different offenders participated in a PRC.
- On June 30, 2015, there were (107) offenders enrolled in the program.

- Non-Secure Programs, Inc.,/Orlando-PRC had the highest number of different offenders enrolled in FY 2013-14, (193).

#### **Table 3C(a):** PRC Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

- This table shows outcomes based on a three (3) year follow-up after the offender first entered a program of this type. They are counted as successful if they *completed* at least one (1) program, regardless of the number of programs they participated in.
- On average, PRCs had a (37.1%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits) from FY 2002-03 to FY 2011-12.
- Success rates have increased from (28.4%) in FY 2010-11 to (37.7%) in FY 2011-12.
- The proportion of offenders whose final program outcome is an administrative exit has averaged (10.0%) from FY 2002-03 to FY 2011-12.

### Table 3C(b): PRC Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

• This table shows outcomes based on a two (2) year follow-up after the offender first entered a PRC. For FY 2012-13, the PRC program had a (39.9%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits).

## Table 3D: FY 2014-15 PRC Exit Data (Event-Based) by Facility

- Reviewing the outcome of the offender's experience in each program from which they exited, the success rate varies from (40.9%) for Non-Secure Programs, Inc. Orlando PRC, to (45.5%) for Phoenix House PRC.
- On average, these programs had a (43.1%) success rate with offenders exiting their program during FY 2014-15. Administrative exits averaged (11.1%) for the year. As seen in the prior table, many of these administrative exits lead to subsequent enrollments in other programs.

# <u>Table 3E: FY 2012-13 (Two-Year Follow-up) PRC Recommitment Data by Level of Participation</u>

- At two (2) years past program completion, recommitment rates for PRC program completers (27.0%) are lower than for program non-completers (59.9%).
- Prison recommitments (new offense or technical) for program completers are substantially lower than that for non-completers (20.7% vs. 55.1%).
- There is a slightly higher rate of return to supervision (new offense or technical) for non-completers (6.3%) than completers (4.8%).

# Table 3F: FY 2011-12 (Three (3) Year Follow-up) PRC Recommitment Data by Level of Participation

- For a three (3) year follow-up period, PRC program completers remain lower than non-completers in overall recommitments (30.9% vs. 76.2%).
- The greatest differences are for recommitment to prison (new offense or technical) for completers (26.8%) and non-completers (69.8%).
- There is a slightly higher rate of return to supervision (new offense or technical) for non-completers (6.4%) than completers (4.1%).

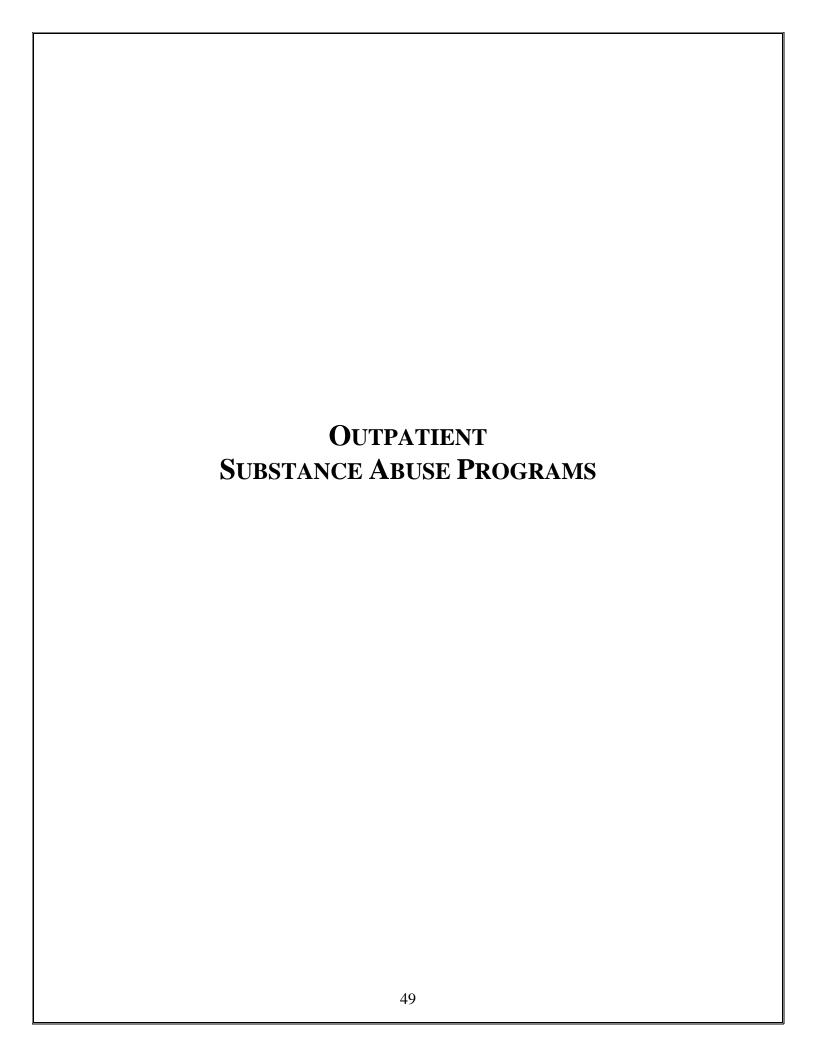

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

## **OUTPATIENT SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS**

Outpatient Treatment Programs are community-based contracted programs that provide individual, group and or family counseling sessions and activities for offenders who are ordered by the court or releasing authority to participate in treatment. Outpatient services are provided on a variety of intensity levels statewide based on the individual offender's needs. These therapeutic activities and interventions focus on changing the offender's behaviors to assist them in their recovery from substance abuse and successful termination from community supervision. Offenders continue to reside and work in the community while participating in treatment. All programs are licensed by the Department of Children and Families.

- 1. **Transitional/Re-Entry Program** (**Aftercare**) provides counseling for offenders, generally in a group setting, who have completed a secure, or nonsecure residential treatment program, probation and restitution center Phase I program, or an outpatient program. This type of program usually lasts from three (3) to six (6) months and focuses on relapse prevention.
- 2. **Day/Night Treatment** is an intensive nonresidential program offering treatment activities during the day or night, which allows offenders to reside at home, maintain full-time employment or attend an educational program. The program provides for consecutive hours of treatment activities at a minimum frequency of four (4) days per week for a period of four (4) weeks. Each offender has a minimum of six (6) hours per week of individual, group or family counseling. The Day/Night treatment program may also include four (4) weeks of reentry treatment where the required treatment activities are gradually decreased. This program is appropriate for those offenders not adapting well in less restrictive treatment and requiring a greater intensity of services.
- 3. **Outpatient Substance Abuse Treatment** services are provided on a variety of intensity levels statewide based on the individual offender's needs. These therapeutic activities and interventions focus on changing the offender's behaviors to assist them in their recovery from substance abuse and successful termination from community supervision.
- 4. **Treatment Alternative to Street Crime (TASC)** is an integral part of intervention programs. TASC agencies primarily serve substance abusers involved in the criminal justice system. TASC services include screening, case identification, court liaison, offender referral and tracking.

- Outpatient enrollments have decreased from 24,044 in FY 2005-06 to 24,015 in FY 2014-15. Enrollments have been relatively stable since FY 2000-01 after larger increases in prior years.

- In FY 2013-14, of the various outpatient programs, the largest number of offenders was enrolled in outpatient substance abuse programs.

#### **OUTCOMES**

### Table 5C(a): Outpatient Program Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

- This table shows outcomes based on a three (3) year follow-up after the offender first entered outpatient treatment of any kind. On average, the outpatient programs had a (71.2%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits) over ten (10) years.
- Success rates were highest for offenders entering in FY 2010-11 (76.6%).

## Table 5C(b): Outpatient Program Outcomes for Offenders by Fiscal Year

• This table shows outcomes based on a two (2) year follow-up after the offender first entered outpatient treatment of any kind. For (FY 2012-13) the outpatient programs had a (75.7%) success rate (successful exits divided by successful and unsuccessful exits).

#### **Table 5D:** FY 2014-15 Outpatient Exit Data (Event-Based) by Facility Type

- Reviewing the outcome of the offender's experience in each program type from which they exited, the success rate varies from (70.3%) for Transition/Re-Entry to (83.0%) for Day/Night Substance Abuse.
- On average, these programs had a 72.8% success rate with offenders exiting their program during this fiscal year. Administrative exits averaged 17.5% for the year.

- Program completers averaged a (11.0%) recommitment rate, compared to (36.1%) for non-completers.
- Program completers had consistently lower recommitment rates for all four (4) types of recommitment categories.
- Only (2.4%) of completers had returned to prison for a new offense at two (2) years after program entrance.

# <u>Table 5F: FY 2011-12 (Three (3) Year Follow-up,) Outpatient Recommitment Data by Level of Participation</u>

- Program completers averaged (16.4%) recommitments, compared to (40.1%) for non-completers.
- Program completers were consistently lower, in all types of recommitment. Returns to prison (new offense or technical) were (9.9%) for completers compared to (29.3%) for non-completers.
